This year, as Autism Academy prepares to finish our 10th year, we decided to ask some of our students about their thoughts and experiences.

#### Question: What are some of your favorite memories at Autism Academy?

Adrian: With teachers, I remember painting an Arizona sunset with Ms. Trisha. That was fun. I also like doing labs and experiments in Science. My favorite was a color changing experiment. A recent memory was helping to squeeze lemons and make lemonade with Ms. Busby. It had some seeds in it, but I learned that they can be used to grow a lemon tree! With friends, I saw one of my friends at McDonalds after school. I was surprised. I liked eating lunch with him and talking. I also remember sitting with a friend at lunch in Ms. Scott's class. When I told him exciting things like getting to level 100 in Prodigy, he would say "what?!" and be really happy for me.

#### Question: What makes Autism Academy different from other schools?

DTAs are great for adults with disabilities who can't work at a typical job. Their members may need extra assistance throughout the day or they may just be looking for a way to get out of the house. Whatever the reason, DTAs are able to provide a welcoming environment full of people who understand their unique needs and want to help them have a happy, fulfilled adult life. Often, members are able to find common interests through the daily activities and build friendships that can last a lifetime.

#### Question: What do you want to do after you graduate from high school?

Adrian: I want to go to a college like ASU. I am not sure what I want to learn or what kind of job I want to do. I do want to work after I graduate college.

#### Question: What would you want people to know about you?

Adrian: I am creative, happy, grateful for everything, hardworking, helpful, quiet, respectful, and curious. I am not just autistic.

#### Question: How do you think people can best support people with autism?

Adrian: Be accepting of all kinds of hard work. Make sure your comments are nice. Please show compassion and gratitude when you talk to us.

## Question: What are some of your favorite memories at Autism Academy?

I made my first friends in Mrs. Sevier's class. They helped me be more comfortable socializing. I also think the teachers have helped me with my reading. It's fun now and I use my reading to learn new words. My favorite things to read are comedy and superhero books.

## Question: What makes Autism Academy different from other schools?

They help you here. Being here makes me feel normal and like I fit in. I didn't know I had autism before I came here. Being here helped me understand that I am autistic and that it's ok. After I graduate, I'm going to miss everything about school.

## Question: What do you want to do after you graduate from high school?

I want to work in a restaurant as a chef. I also want to move out and live on my own.

## Question: How do you think people can best support people with autism?

Don't force us to talk to you about our autism because it isn't the most important thing about us. Let us decide if we want to talk about it. Don't assume we need help. It's really frustrating and annoying when people assume I can't read something at places like restaurants.
